

Hypothyroidism: insufficiently active thyroid. Your veterinarian can determine if your dog is suffering from this problem and prescribe treatment. Knee and joint issues: This is a common problem among many breeds, especially with the age of dogs. Allergies: Seasonal and skin allergies can cause a lot of discomfort in your dog.
